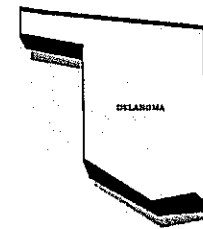

COURT ORDER REQUIREMENTS

THE OKLAHOMA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS IS NOT CURRENTLY UNDER A FEDERAL OR STATE COURT ORDER DURING THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2005.

STATE INITIATIVES

ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES

AT THE CURRENT TIME, ELDERLY OR INFIRMED INMATES ARE NOT HOUSED SEPARATELY. OLDER, SICKER INMATES GREATLY ADD TO THE OKLAHOMA PRISON SYSTEM COSTS. HEALTH CARE EXPENSES FOR PERSONS AGE 55 TO 64 ARE MORE THAN TWICE THE AMOUNT AS THOSE FOR THE 19 TO 44 AGE GROUP. FOR FY 04 OKLAHOMA DOC'S PER INMATE EXPENDITURES FOR HEALTH CARE IS \$2,850 FOR PRISONERS HOUSED IN STATE PRISONS.

PRISON BASED SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT PROGRAMS

THE OKLAHOMA DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS UTILIZES "BEST PRACTICES" RESEARCH IN THE DESIGN AND DELIVERY OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT TO OFFENDERS. ALL SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT (SAT) PROGRAMS CURRENTLY UTILIZE A COGNITIVE BEHAVIORAL MODEL OF TREATMENT. PLACEMENT INTO SAT PROGRAMS IS BASED ON AN ASSESSED NEED. SAT PROGRAMS VARY IN LENGTH FROM 4 MONTHS TO 1 YEAR. DOC SPENDS A TOTAL OF \$1.7 MILLION IN FEDERAL AND STATE FUNDS ON SAT, INCLUDING PERSONNEL AND OPERATING EXPENSES. OKLAHOMA DOC HAS EIGHT TREATMENT (4 PRIVATE/ 4 PUBLIC) PROGRAMS STATEWIDE, WHILE THE OKLAHOMA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH FUNDS ANOTHER 4 SAT PROGRAMS.

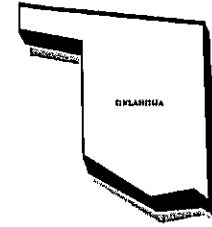
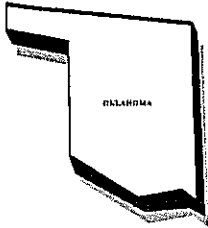
PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS

P.R.O.T.E.C.T. (PARTNERSHIP FOR THE REINTEGRATION OF OFFENDERS THROUGH EDUCATION AND COMMUNITY TREATMENT) IS A FEDERALLY FUNDED GRANT PROJECT INVOLVING THE OKLAHOMA DOC AND SEVERAL STATE AND COMMUNITY AGENCIES. THE FOCUS OF THE PROJECT IS TO SUCCESSFULLY TRANSITION AT-RISK OFFENDERS BACK INTO SOCIETY. PROTECT IS DESIGNED TO ASSIST WITH THE REENTRY NEEDS OF INMATES WHO ARE WITHIN SIX MONTHS OF RELEASE, AND ARE BETWEEN 18 AND 35 YEARS OF AGE, HAVE SERVED AT LEAST ONE YEAR IN DOC CUSTODY, SCORE "HIGH-RISK" RANGE ON THE LEVEL OF SERVICE INVENTORY, REVISED (LSI-R), ARE RETURNING TO THE OKLAHOMA COUNTY AREA AND HAVE VOLUNTEERED FOR THE PROJECT.

PRE-RELEASE/POST-RELEASE ("REENTRY") PROGRAMS (CONTINUED)

THE REENTRY PROCESS BEGINS WHEN OFFENDERS ENTER THE CUSTODY OF DOC. THE LSI-R AND OTHER ASSESSMENTS ARE ADMINISTERED AT THE ASSESSMENT AND RECEPTION CENTER. A CASE PLAN IS DEVELOPED FOR EACH OFFENDER AND FORWARDED TO THE FACILITY WHERE THEY ARE ASSIGNED.

FOUR TRANSITION WORKERS ARE EMPLOYED THROUGH GRANT FUNDS AT TWO OKLAHOMA CITY/COUNTY WORKFORCE OKLAHOMA SITES, THE OKLAHOMA CITY OFFICE OF WEED AND SEED AND THE OKLAHOMA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH. TRANSITION WORKERS ASSIST OFFENDERS WITH HOUSING, TRANSPORTATION, AND EMPLOYMENT, ALONG WITH ANY ON-GOING TREATMENT THE OFFENDER MIGHT NEED.

IT APPEARS THAT THE AT-RISK OFFENDERS BENEFIT FROM ASSISTANCE WITH THEIR TRANSITION FROM PRISON TO THE COMMUNITY. WHEN COMPARED WITH A CONTROL GROUP IN TULSA COUNTY AFTER A 13 MONTH STUDY, THE RECIDIVISM RATE OF PROTECT PARTICIPANTS WAS REDUCED BY 15%.

ANOTHER REENTRY EFFORT BEING CONDUCTED IN THE STATE IS THE USE OF WRAPAROUND SERVICES. FOUR TRANSITION COORDINATORS WERE HIRED TO WORK WITH OFFENDERS IN FIVE INSTITUTIONS THAT HAVE TRADITIONALLY RELEASED THE MOST OFFENDERS SCORING IN A MODERATE TO HIGH-RISK RANGE ON THE LSI-R. TRANSITION COORDINATORS DETERMINE THE OFFENDER'S STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES AND ASSIST THE OFFENDER IN FORMING A TEAM OF SUPPORT. THE TEAM MEETS WITH THE OFFENDER TO ADDRESS ISSUES THE OFFENDER WILL FACE UPON RELEASE AND DEVELOP A PLAN FOR THE OFFENDER. THIS PROJECT HAS ONLY RECENTLY BEGUN SO NO IMPACT HAS BEEN STUDIED.

CONCERNS WITH AGING ADULT CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES

THE AVERAGE AGE OF OKLAHOMA'S 19 CORRECTIONAL CENTERS IS 30.84 YEARS. THE NEWEST FACILITY WAS BUILT IN 1998, WHILE THE OLDEST IS 95 YEARS OLD. MAINTAINING AGING FACILITIES WITH AN INCREASING INMATE POPULATION HAS BECOME AN ISSUE. THE OKLAHOMA DOC HAS REQUESTED ADDITIONAL FUNDING FROM THE STATE LEGISLATURE TO ADDRESS THE ISSUE. THUS FAR, OKLAHOMA HAS ACHIEVED LIMITED SUCCESS IN DEALING WITH THIS.
