

poverty



MOST FOOD INSECURE CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICTS (TOP 44)










POVERTY ≠ FOOD INSECURITY

Food Insecure Individuals, 2009












FOOD PRICE VARIATION ACROSS THE US









WHO EXPERIENCES FOOD INSECURITY?

Counties and CDs with majority populations of color are disproportionately impacted by food insecurity.

Race/Ethnic Breakout	# of counties in US	% of counties in Top 10% Food Insecure
Majority African American	93	82% (N=76)
Majority Hispanic	70	29% (N=20)
Majority American Indian	26	35% (N=9)
Majority White, Non- Hispanic	2,835	7% (N=191)
